Choose from various different templates – maybe a bird? A butterfly? A dragon? Or even a winged horse!






PUPPET FILM MAKING

This Alibi Exchange comes from our good friend loan, who is 6. Ioan decided to have a go at making his own film with puppets (perhaps you could even use the puppets from the previous Alibi Exchange to use in your film?).

Here are some tips from loan on how to make a film of your own:



Think of a story that you would like to tell. Draw your characters onto paper and cut them out. loan stuck his characters onto lolly sticks, but you could use a pencil or a rolled up piece of paper – anything stick-like! Make a background for your story.

Where is it happening? On a beach? In a city? On the moon? In a castle? It can be anywhere you like.

Draw a picture, or if you have a printer you could choose a picture and print it out. Stick it to the wall with something that doesn't mark, like tack or masking tape. Now you can get your characters to act out the story in front of your background. What objects could you use? loan looked around the house and used a torch as a brilliant spaceship.

You can be inventive - a straw hat can be a sand dune, a spoon can be a mirror.

Look at everyday things and imagine what what they could become.

Film your story! loan had some help here. It was filmed onto a phone. He played some music in the background to help make the film especially dramatic.










Poetry & Illustrations

I'm travelling round by mouth.


I went to the land of pizza pie

And fished for anchovies.


I climbed aboard a raft of toast

IF YOU'D LIKE, YOU CAN FOLLOW THE SAME PATTERN THAT DANIEL DID AS HE WROTE THE POEM. HERE'S HOW TO DO IT:

Listen very carefully and you'll be able to hear that there are:

FOUR beats in the first line

THREE beats in the second line

FOUR beats in the third line

And THREE beats in the fourth line.

I WENT to the LAND of Pizza PiE
And SWAM in a LAKE of CHEESE
I SAT uPON a CRUSty BEACH
And FISHED for AnchoVIES.

There's also a rhyming scheme, which you may have spotted.

The ends of the SECOND and FOURTH lines rhyme with each other:

And swam in a lake of CHEESE
I sat upon a crusty beach
And fished for anchoVIES.
